- •A new series which focuses on maintaining a healthy, safe environment for children



## Plastic Bottle and Jar Activities

#### Infan

Shake! Shake! Shake!

Materials: Plastic peanut butter jars with lids, variety of noisy materials (rice, bells, beads, etc.), glue

Fill several plastic peanut butter jars with different noisy materials. Glue lids securely in place. Offer jars for babies to explore. Observe to see which sounds babies play with more often.

#### <u>Toddlers</u>

In and Out

Materials: Saltine cracker box, 2-liter clear (empty) soda bottle, colorful noisy materials (beads, buttons, marbles), glue, colorful contact paper

Remove the top flaps from a saltine cracker box. Cover the box with colored contact paper. Put colorful noisy materials such as buttons, beads, or marbles in a 2-liter clear plastic soda bottle. Glue the lid securely in place. Place the bottle inside the cracker box. Offer the toy to a toddler and allow him or her to explore ways to play with it. Make enough of these for your class to eliminate the need for sharing.

#### Preschoolers

I Spy Bottle

Materials: 1-liter clear (empty) plastic bottle, variety of colored materials (marbles, beads, buttons, plastic gemstones, florist rocks, shells), small familiar objects (car, crayon piece, birthday candle, plastic ring, etc.), self-adhesive label, glue, markers

Fill a 1-liter clear plastic bottle with a variety of colorful materials, leaving enough room to shake, roll, and turn the materials around inside the bottle. Place several familiar items inside the bottle. Glue the lid securely on the bottle. Draw pictures of the familiar items

on a self-adhesive label and put the label on the bottle. Shake the bottle to hide the items among the colorful materials. Offer the bottle to a child to explore and find the hidden objects.

#### **Schoolagers**

Glow Jars

Materials: plastic jars with lids, neon glow sticks, scissors


Offer a jar to each child. Use scissors to clip the ends off glow sticks. Put the glow sticks inside the jars and shake to make splashes of color on the inside of the jars. Put the lids on jars and set in bright light (sunlight or under a lamp) for at least 30 minutes. Take jars into a dim room to see the jars glow with colors. Recharge the colors by placing the jars in bright light for half an hour.

**It's Back to School Time!** Why not consider going back to school? T.E.A.C.H (Teacher Education And Compensation Helps) is a scholarship program that was developed to increase the level of education and effectiveness of early learning professionals by making the educational process more affordable.

Scholarships are currently offered for the CDA (Child Development Associate) Assessment Fee, Associate Degrees in Child Development and Early Care and Education, and Bachelor Degrees in Child Development and Early Care and Education. T.E.A.C.H. Early Childhood® ALABAMA provides scholarships to child care center and preschool teachers, directors, and family home providers. ## Alabama Early Learning Guidelines Offered Again in Dothan and Montgomery

The Alabama Early Learning Guidelines Course is written to promote continuity of high quality care and learning for children for birth through five years of age. This course is an eighteen hour course which consists of nine training sessions that are a guide for understanding child development and learning, and for implementing best practices in order to prepare children for success in school and in life. Individuals are encouraged to attend all nine training sessions as together they address the development of the whole child.

After completing the entire course, participants will be awarded the Alabama Early Learning Guideline Credential by the Alabama Department of Human Resources. Each 2 hour session attended will provide a Family Guidance Center certificate for that session.

There is no fee to attend the AELG Course. This course is for Child Care Directors, Child Care Center Teachers, Family and Group Child Care Providers, Relative Care Provider and Parents. All classes are taught by specifically trained Family Guidance Center staff. We will be offering the Alabama Early Learning Guidelines in October in Dothan and in January in Montgomery. You may sign up now!
