DAVID KISOR is a multi-award winning singer, songwriter, composer, performer and teacher who creates music CDs that

translate key findings from recent child development research into practical and entertaining products and performance events for children, teachers and parents. David tours all over the United States, and internationally; and has trained over 65,000 teachers on how to use music in the classroom; in addition to presenting hundreds of concert events for children and their families. Songs focus on topics such as creativity, curiosity, hope, optimism, mindfulness, self-control, confidence, mastery motivation, resilience, empathy, acceptance, teamwork, responsibility and more. His songs, published by GROWING SOUND are geared primarily for children ages 0-10.

Sessions for Sensational Saturday:

Songs of Resilience: Music For Social and Emotional Development

Using resilience theory and research, we will explore songs that promote attachment to caring adults, the initiative to turn mystery into mastery, and tools for self-control. Participants will move and sing songs and discuss related classroom activities that can accompany the songs and enhance their message and skills

Music that Matters for Infants and Toddlers: Songs of Security and Stepping Out

In this workshop, participants will learn how songs can be used to build a secure bond between caring adult and infant, preparing the way to build positive motivation and self regulation skills in toddlers. Participants will become familiar with appropriate key research findings, listen to and learn the songs based on the research, and explore ways to use the songs and the supportive materials in the infant/toddler development center.

Dr. Charlotte Hendricks, President and founder of www.childhealthonline.org, has promoted health education for young children, parents, and teachers for over 30 years. She pioneered research and curriculum development for preschool health education based on the principle that adults are responsible for children's health and safety; however,



young children need to explore their work and begin to develop decision-making skills and healthy habits to promote lifelong health. She earned her Bachelor's and Master's degrees from Western Kentucky University, and a doctoral degree from Indiana University. Her formal education focused on health and safety, program evaluation, and research in early childhood health education.

Mr. Michael A. Holt retired as the Assistant Director for Programs within Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), Homeland Security Investigations (HSI). In this position, he was responsible for strategic planning, national policy implementation, and the development and execution of operational initiatives spanning four major investigative program divisions within HSI: National Security Investigations;

Financial, Narcotics and Public Safety Investigations; Critical Infrastructure Protection and Fraud Investigations; and Investigative Services.

QRIS Update Magazine Activities

The pilot phase of the Quality Rating and Improvement System for Alabama has begun with 50 centers participating in this process. These centers will be using the PAS (Program Administration Scale), the ITERS-R (Infant/Toddler Environment Rating Scale) and the ECERS-R (Early Childhood Environment Rating Scale) as the assessment tools for

The PAS is designed to reliably measure and improve the leadership and management practices of center-based programs. The ITERS-R is designed to assess group programs for children birth to two and a half years of age. The ECERS-R is used to assess programs for children two and a half through five years of age. These rating scales are used to assess quality in child care programs and are proven and reliable.

The Benefits of Using the Scales:

Children: Protects their basic needs, health and safety, and offers opportunities for stimulation and learning experiences Child Care Staff: Allows staff to see what changes will benefit the classroom, the child and families

The Child Care Program: Provides a roadmap to quality child care

These rating scales are available for checkout in both the Montgomery and Dothan Resource Libraries.

Infant - Magazine Picture Book

Materials: Old magazines, glue, white paper plates, hole punch, yarn Cut familiar pictures from old magazines. Glue a picture on the front and back of a white paper plate. Write the name of the picture under the picture with a colored marker. Punch holes in the paper plates and fasten them together with yarn. Hold a baby on your lap and share the book. Point to pictures as you say the names.

Toddlers - Turning Pages Practice

Materials: Old magazines

Offer old magazines to toddlers and encourage them to use thumbs and pointer fingers to turn the pages. Toddlers need practice in learning how to turn pages without tearing them. When



magazines are well-worn from page-turning practice, use the remaining pages for toddlers to practice using a glue stick to glue pictures onto scrap paper.

Preschoolers - Magazine Collage

Materials: Old magazines, poster board, glue Help children cut pictures from magazines. Children can use glue sticks to glue the pictures onto a poster board. Encourage children to cover the whole poster board with pictures. Hang the poster at children's eyelevel. Call out a name of a picture on the collage; encourage a child to find the named picture on the



Schoolagers - Favorite Books


Materials: Old magazines, construction paper, glue, hole punch, yarn Schoolagers can look through old magazines to find pictures of favorite things. They cut out the pictures, glue them onto pieces of construction paper, and label the pictures. Punch holes in each page and tie them together with lengths of varn. Schoolagers can

Infant Quality Tip Why Begin Language and Literacy with Infants? The early years of life are a period in which the foundation for future learning is being laid at the emotional, cognitive, experiential, and even cellular levels. Babies are communicating from day one. They use their gestures, sounds, and expressions to communicate feelings and needs like hunger, sleepiness, joy, etc. Even before a baby's first word, she will develop her own unique ways of communicating. Reading a baby's cues is an important way to build her language skills. Watch to see how she communicates her thoughts and feelings. How do you know when she is hungry, happy, or uncomfortable? What gestures does she use? What sounds does she make? Understanding a baby's unique way of communication will help you meet her needs and recognize her likes and dislikes.
